When Merton was still in his early twenties, an intensely active and brilliant young man, he found that nothing in his worldly life assuaged a growing restlessness. A curiosity about spiritual matters, fueled by the writings of Etienne Gilson and the poetry of Gerard Manley Hopkins and William Blake, led him first to baptism as a Catholic and ultimately to entry into a Trappist monastery—"the four walls of my new freedom." Here he wrote his extraordinary testament, the unique spiritual document of a man who withdrew from the world only after he had fully immersed himself in it.
